Dear Faith Family,

This past Tuesday at 6 p.m., our first Warming Shelter officially closed after 19 days of sub-freezing temperatures. And of course, we celebrated with food and fellowship—it's what we do.

The numbers tell part of the story: 1,000+ hours of volunteer time, nearly 60 meals served, five guests sheltered. But the real story is in the changed lives—both guests and hosts—and in the leap of faith you all took to meet a need none of us had all the answers for.

When we heard on January 22nd that 60 people were on Haven Ministries' waiting list and Union County had no open shelters, we knew we had to do something. As a Red Cross Disaster Recovery partner, we thought: why not this?

We opened with more questions than answers, and we learned as we went. From ways to schedule to opportunities to streamline and better utilize resources. However, once again, as with everything we do when we are being the church, living into community, it became a labor of love. While we served five guests altogether, three of them were with us for two weeks, and all three have told stories and commented how the warming shelter saved their lives. One was trapped and found by the fire department when a tent she was living in collapsed under the weight of the snow. Another was on his journey walking home with miles to go when the storm and cold came. Another had no place to go but his car.

And even while the shelter was open, we got to be the church in all our usual ways. We celebrated the lives of saints gone before us, we worshiped, we gathered for fellowship and offered food to families in need. But one of the biggest things we got to do was celebrate when our own Katy received her kidney after eight long years of waiting. We prayed for the donor's family, and we gave thanks to God for Katy's resilience. Even our shelter guests joined in on the prayers and rejoicing. Our guests became examples of what we often say: you come through our doors as visitors and by the time you leave, you are forever family.

This spirit of welcome isn't new for us. It strikes me that we see it every week at Fresh Express, where our food distribution guests have also become family. They share prayer requests and joys with us. They laugh when one of our volunteers tries to speak their native language. They show up often or occasionally, and all are treated the same—with great love and respect.

In listening to the testimony of one of our visitors this past week, something she said struck me: she felt the warmth of this place the moment she pulled into the parking lot. That touched my heart because no matter the weather our ushers and greeters are out there, welcoming strangers and old friends and family alike. It made me think: this place of welcome, of love for one another, takes all of us. We walk life's journeys together, no one is an outsider, and we get to share love with all who pull into our parking lot because we are all on a journey together—all here for one another.

So, to everyone from Warming Shelter volunteers, to Fresh Express organizers and deliverers, to the ones sitting by the bedside with Katy, Amy, and Staci, I say thank you. Thank you for making this a place of love and community, a place where all are not only welcomed but loved and respected right where they are. Will we always get it right? No. But our work together continues, and we'll keep showing up, learning, and loving one another better every day.

And here's the thing: logo wear is completely optional. You don't need a shirt to help us march, and you don't need a parade to wear one. We're just making it available because you asked.

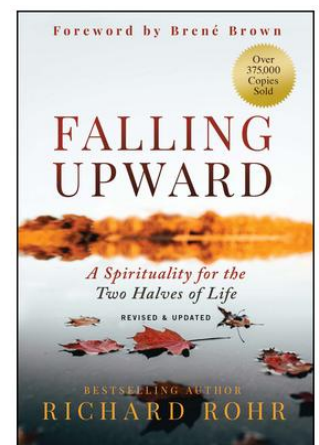
Falling Upward: A Reflective Lenten Book Study. What if the second half of life isn't about getting older, but about becoming more fully alive? That's what Richard Rohr explores in *Falling Upward: A Spirituality for the Two Halves of Life*—and Chaplain Kate invites you to explore it with her.

Over four weeks this Lenten season, we'll journey together through Rohr's insights on how heartbreak, disappointment, and failure aren't obstacles to spiritual growth—they're gateways to it. We'll rediscover the wisdom of our inner child. We'll embrace our "shadow-self" as a teacher. We'll learn to mirror our God-self in thought and action. And we'll do it together, in community. Here's what to expect:

- **March 4:** The First Half of Life—Understanding how life's early heartbreaks and disappointments are actually stepping stones
- **March 11:** The Tragic Sense of Life—Why doing it wrong teaches us more than doing it right
- **March 18:** Amnesia—Rediscovering enchantment, love, unique journeys, and the grace of our failures
- **March 25:** The Spirit of Self—Mirroring God's image in all we do and all we are

As Chaplain Kate says, "Father Rohr has a way of writing simply and prophetically, both at the same time and in this century." His words have shaped her spiritual journey, and she's genuinely looking forward to this conversation with you.

Join us: Wednesdays at 6:30 p.m. in the Gathering Room, March 4–25. Come early for tea, bring your beautiful heart, and let's explore this together.





Recalculating: A Sermon Series for Lent. You know that moment when your GPS recalculates? When you've gone off course and that familiar voice says, "Recalculating"—and suddenly you're redirected toward your destination? That's what this Lenten season is about.

Following Jesus isn't a straight line. It's a journey that often calls us to recalculate—to rethink our thoughts, our actions, our prayers, our conversations with God. It invites us to ask: Am I still heading where God is calling me?

This Lent, Pastor Tim will preach a series called Recalculating, exploring pivotal moments in Jesus' life and ministry—times when He adjusted course, challenged assumptions, and showed us what it means to respond with the Holy Spirit's guidance rather than our own fear or habit. Each week, we'll discover how those moments speak to our recalculations, our redirections, our call to live more faithfully.

Here's what's ahead:

- **Ash Wednesday, February 18 @ 7 p.m.:** Special music, reflection, and the beginning of our journey together in the Sanctuary with imposition of ashes.
- **Following Sundays through Easter (April 5):** Weekly sermons exploring Jesus' most transformative moments.

This isn't just about giving something up for Lent. It's about recalculating toward something—toward deeper faith, toward justice, toward love, toward home. We'd love to have you on this journey. See you Wednesday.

On the Journey Together



Sundays @ The Farm. At 9 a.m. our coffee is brewing, and the nursery and sensory rooms are staffed and open. Our **Faith Connections** classes run from 9 to 10 a.m. and include Pre-K to 3rd Grade **Explorers**; 4th to 8th Grade **Pathfinders**; and 9th Grade to Age 99 **Travelers**. From 10 a.m. to 10:20, please enjoy breakfast, coffee, and fellowship then worship begins at 10:30. Following the “Time with Our Children,” during worship, kiddos aged 3 to 2nd grade head back to the classroom for “**Children’s Church**” and return to worship following Pastor Tim’s sermon. On the first Sunday of each month, we celebrate **Holy Communion** together. And, monthly on the 2nd Sunday, we enjoy **Family Night** from 5 to 6:45. Weekdays @ The Farm. Each Monday at 10 a.m. a group gathers for **Monday Morning Reflections**, a relaxing time with Pastor Tim to dig deeper into the scripture from our Sunday service. On Wednesdays is **Lunch with the Pastor** from 11:30 to 1:00. Pick up lunch at the Farmer’s Market across the bridge from the farm or bring your own and join Pastor Tim. Then on Wednesday evenings, we offer **Wednesday Evening Interactive**, a seasonal book/bible study. On the 1st and 3rd Wednesdays of each month is **Friends Who Breakfast**, a popular time to gather to catch up over conversation and breakfast at Street of Shops (9:45) on the 1st Wednesday and Silver Moon Restaurant (9:30) on the 3rd Wednesday. On the 4th Friday of each month, you can find a Saint Paul’s group gathering at Union Cellars Winery for **Word, Wine, and Wisdom**, from 4:30 to 6:30 p.m. Always a fun time as Pastor Tim tosses out a bible word to discuss with laughter and love.

Music @ The Farm. Our **Chancel Choir**, directed by Patty Wagner with Sharon Styer, pianist, rehearses each Sunday morning from 9 to 10. Our choir averages 25+ singers and there’s always room for more! We also have a **Hand Bell Choir** which rehearses on Wednesday evenings from 5:15 to 6:15 and plays for worship on the 1st and 3rd Sundays. The **Children’s Choir** practices during a portion of the Faith Connection classes with Miss Sharon and Miss Ashley and they bless our worship time once a month with their selections.

Serving @ The Farm.

Mission and Outreach is an integral part of us “being the church” at Saint Paul’s. On the 2nd & 4th Thursdays of each month, we offer a **Fresh Express Food Distribution** in partnership with the Central PA Food Bank. Volunteers join us from 1 to 5 p.m. at Grace Place @ The Farm as

we receive, sort, and distribute fresh food and groceries to our neighbors. All are welcome as we have a wonderful time serving together. Next distributions are February 12 and 26. We also participate in **Community Harvest**, a monthly distribution on the 3rd Saturday from 10 a.m. to noon at St. John’s UCC and in conjunction with Bucknell’s Center for Community Engaged Leadership, Learning & Research. And, Saint Paul’s has a long history of offering an **Emergency Food Pantry** that we lovingly refer to as our “Little Red Wagon” Our needs at this time are for: **Local Grocery Gift Cards to: Aldi, Giant and Weis. Gas Cards: Sheetz, Wawa, and Weis, any canned fruits and vegetables with pop tops, shelf stable milk, small bottles of vegetable oil, and canned proteins and box dinners, i.e. hamburger and tuna helper.** You may drop food items in the little red wagon on the porch outside the Sanctuary door and gift cards may be dropped in the offering plate on Sunday morning or to the church office throughout the week.
