Dear Family,

Below is my letter to our Consistory this week which I would like to share with you all.

Ruth Henry's illness and passing reconnected me with a mutual friend our families had from several years ago. We stayed in touch via email during her illness as she wanted reports on Ruth and Al and then we got to reconnect briefly when they came to the service of Celebration of Life on Saturday. After they returned home to Baltimore, I received an email saying they were "in awe of the church and all the love." She shared how she found what we had here so unique and this is what they missed so much in their lives.

Her note struck me a bit, we are who we are by choice, we get to love and care for one another in the ways we do, by choice. God has given us the opportunity to serve our neighbors in beautiful ways, to love one another, and while we all bring different gifts to the table, God just seems to know what God is doing and offering us. We just need to continually seek and live into all the opportunities we have to be the church.

This all seems to ring true to me. Whether we are serving a family who has lost a loved one, caring for a family facing illness, celebrating a new baby, or simply sharing everyday life together—we do it all from a place of love. We do it with an attitude of "we get to," not "we have to." And we get to do it with people whose like-mindedness isn't based on some socioeconomic or political leaning, instead just that we all get to be the church together, bringing our individual gifts and throwing them in the mix that everyone will realize there is a place here for them if they feel or choose to make this their home, whether they just come here once or all the time.

All this I say to you, not to say "ok, we've achieved it," because I don't know if we will ever fully achieve it, but to say, keep on, keep on welcoming the stranger, speaking to those you may not know, don't just smile and walk by, stop and say hello and welcome. Help the parent of a rambunctious child know that it's ok their child may make noise or lie on the sanctuary floor. Offer the single mother a hand, be there to reassure the parents of an autistic child, "it's ok," because we get to be here and share in our gifts of love and welcome and a journey with one another.

Each month I get to report to you how we are doing as a church and things I get to experience. One of the amazing things I have gotten to experience is when the need became so great over the past month people stepped up in ways more extravagantly than ever. Yes, our operations income is still lagging a bit behind for this time of year, as it does every year, however our missional giving is greater than it ever has been and over the last month has been greater than \$10,400! These are funds we use to feed, house, and support our neighbors, and we are called to do so as extravagantly as we have received these gifts. That's not an easy mindset for some. We receive extravagant gifts, my prayer is that we give back extravagantly, as the Apostle Paul reminded the church at Philippi after they had supported him and so many others, God would supply all their needs, so keep giving radically. All we have to do is continue to use our resources for God's good justice in the world around us, placing our faith and trust in a loving God who cares deeply for us and all our neighbors.

In the coming weeks, you will hear more about our numbers of how the church is doing in annual reports and letters, so for now, let's just focus on all we have to be thankful for, all we get to do, and all those we get to do it for, and give all thanks and glory to a God who loves us all so.

Please make every effort to be here when you can (because we're not the same when you're not here), and not just for you but for one another. To greet those you may not know, to welcome strangers and hopefully help them feel at home, to be a part of the faith community here @ The Farm and share the gifts of love and grace God has already given us so extravagantly, so let's share them with one another and all we meet, just as radically.

The Farm Report

It's So Much More! Over the past six weeks, this community has touched lives in ways that ripple far beyond what we can see. Through soup sales, bake sales, craft sales and a wonderfully creative Barnyard Sale, you didn't just raise money—you actively participated in God's mission of caring for our neighbors.

Let me share something that captures the heart of what happened. Cyndy Kister, brainchild of the Barnyard Sale, sent this note to her team this week:

"I just wanted to say thank you to all you gals who helped make the Barnyard Sale such a success! Amazing! I spoke with Haven Ministry, and they were thrilled with the donations. Doug's truck was loaded to the brim. They've been able to set up housing for 14 families so far this past year and our donations will help with even more. We may never know all the lives we've touched, but we trust, with God's help, we're making a difference. One of the items we took down as a step stool, one little boy living in the shelter grabbed it and was carrying it around with him, it was so sweet."

Here's what that looked like in numbers: 320 quarts (80 gallons) of preordered soup sales accounted for \$3,200. Our day of Soup, Bake, and Craft Sale brought in \$2,600, with another 20 gallons of homemade soup PLUS all the delicious baked goods and beautiful crafts. And the first annual Barnyard Sale netted \$2,400. Moreover, "Phil the Freezer," once again organized by Earl Fisher, raised \$2,200 in the four

weeks prior to the sale. That's \$10,400 raised in just six weeks for Missions! And that doesn't INCLUDE the donations of items we then offered to Fresh Express recipients, Haven Ministry, and Dig Furniture Bank! So, here's the thing—it's SO MUCH MORE than \$10,400, while that in itself is amazing. It's helping families with

housing. It's a little boy carrying around a step stool, something so small yet so meaningful to him. Its neighbors fed through Fresh Express and able to get some things for their homes. It's furniture that turns an empty apartment into a home. It's the ripple effect of generosity that touches lives in ways we may never fully know.

This is what being the church looks like. Not just gathering on Sunday mornings, but rolling up our sleeves, cooking soup, organizing sales, loading trucks to the brim, and trusting that as the Holy Spirit moves us, we're making a real difference in real lives.

As we enter this Thanksgiving season, take a moment to appreciate what God has allowed us to accomplish together. And get ready—because I have a feeling the Holy Spirit isn't done with us yet. After all, we get to be Saint Paul's @ The Farm, the church! Happy Thanksgiving!



Serving @ The Farm. Mission and Outreach is an integral part of us "being the church" at Saint Paul's. On the 2nd & 4th Thursdays of each month, we offer a Fresh Express Food Distribution in partnership with the Central PA Food Bank (next distributions are Tuesday, November 25, Thursday, December 11, and Tuesday, December 23). Volunteers join us from 1 to 5 p.m. at Grace Place @ The Farm as we receive, sort, and distribute fresh food and groceries to our neighbors. All are welcome as we have a wonderful time serving together. We also participate in Community Harvest, a monthly distribution on the 3rd Saturday from 10 a.m. to noon at St. John's UCC and in conjunction with Bucknell's Center for Community Engaged Leadership, Learning & Research. And, Saint Paul's has a long history of offering an Emergency Food Pantry that we lovingly refer to as our "Little Red Wagon" Our needs at this time are for: Local Grocery Gift Cards to: Aldi, Giant and Weis. Gas Cards: Sheetz, Wawa, and Weis, any canned fruits and vegetables with pop tops, shelf stable milk, small bottles of vegetable oil,

and canned proteins and box dinners, i.e. hamburger and tuna helper. You may drop food items in the little red wagon on the porch outside the Sanctuary door and gift cards may be dropped in the offering plate on Sunday morning or to the church office throughout the week.
