Dear Family,

This past Thursday, around the world, our Jewish brothers and sisters observed the highest Holy day of the year for them, Yom Kippur. Yom Kippur is also known as the Day of Atonement and is marked by a day of fasting, prayer, and reflection.

At its heart, Yom Kippur invites an unflinching moral inventory asking of oneself:

What harm have I done?

Whom have I failed to see?

Where has my silence become complicity?

As Cameron Trimble reminded us this week in her Thursday devotion, "This is not shame work. It is soul work." It's not experienced as a form of punishment. Instead, it is a clearing out of the clutter that keeps us from living fully with integrity, into our relationship between us and God.

I believe we would all do well to follow this sacred rhythm. And I dare say - at a minimum - we would do well to follow this lead. In an age of blame and vengeance, Yom Kippur teaches us to look inward before casting stones outward. It dares us to believe that change is still possible, that forgiveness is real, that we can begin again, reset.

Though while many of us reading this are not Jewish, we still have the same needs and desires to be connected one to another, and we are all in need of atonement. For many:

- Our relationships cry out for mending.
- Our systems are corrupt with injustice.
- Our lives often veer from our deepest values.
- Our politics pit neighbor against neighbor.
- Our language wounds more than it heals.
- Our economy rewards greed over generosity.
- Our institutions prioritize power over people.
- Our culture forgets the sacredness of the Earth.
- Our attention fractures across a thousand distractions.
- Our spirits grow numb from too much noise and not enough meaning.

So even if we do not fast for a day or our practices are different, in an age of blame and vengeance, Yom Kippur teaches us to look inward before casting stones outward. It dares us to believe that change is still possible, that forgiveness is real, that we can begin again. And I believe we need to find time, to take time, to pause and reflect. The benefit of this time seems to me to far outweigh the costs of our time.

Recently I walked the Dale Engle Walker trail, leaving my phone behind. It offered me a short stint of this reflective time, enough that it left my soul longing for a bit more. It reminded me that I would love to see us have a labyrinth, a place to walk and intentionally reflect on our own well-being and faith relationship, here @ The Farm. For I believe we all need to "repair what is broken, to renew what is holy, to begin again" just as our Jewish siblings do so intentionally and beautifully. And done with intentionality, walking a Labyrinth offers these things for us.

On the Journey Together

Sundays @ The Farm. At 9 a.m. our coffee is brewing, and the nursery and sensory rooms are staffed and open. Our <u>Faith Connections</u> classes run from 9 to 10 a.m. and include Pre-K to 3rd Grade "<u>Explorers</u>" with Miss Colleen, 4th to 8th Grade "<u>Pathfinders</u>" with Miss Krysta, and 9th Grade to Age 99 "<u>Travelers</u>" with Nicole and Dale Cuer. From 10 a.m. to 10:20, please enjoy breakfast, coffee, and fellowship then worship begins at 10:30. Following the "Time with Our Children," during worship, kiddos aged 3 to 2nd grade head back to the classroom for "<u>Children's Church</u>" with Miss Colleen and return to worship following Pastor Tim's sermon. On the first Sunday of each month, we celebrate <u>Holy Communion</u> together. And, monthly on the 2nd Sunday, we enjoy <u>Family Night</u> together from 5 to 6:45 (October 12). <u>Confirmation Class</u> with Pastor Tim and Miss Lisa meets on the 2nd and 4th Sunday evenings at 5 p.m.

Serving @ The Farm. Mission and Outreach is an integral part of us "being the church" at Saint Paul's. On the 2nd & 4th Thursdays of each month, we offer a Fresh Express Food Distribution (October 9 & 23) in partnership with the Central PA Food Bank. Volunteers join us from 1 to 5 p.m. at Grace Place @ The Farm as we receive, sort, and distribute fresh food and groceries to our neighbors. All are welcome as we have a wonderful time serving together. We also participate in **Community Harvest**, a monthly distribution on the 3rd Saturday from 10 a.m. to noon at St. John's UCC and in conjunction with Bucknell's Center for Community Engaged Leadership, Learning & Research. And, Saint Paul's has a long history of offering an "Emergency Food Pantry" that we lovingly refer to as our "Little Red Wagon" giving. The pantry is located in Grace Place @ the Farm and current needs that can be dropped in the wagon are: Canned fruits, vegetables, and soups, oatmeal, box potatoes, shelf stable milk, peanut butter, jelly, spaghetti sauce, mac & cheese, tuna, salmon, canned meats, and grocery gift cards.
